Prevention News - Child Victims of Human Trafficking

ODE mandates under Safety and Violence Prevention Training (see related workshop information under Professional Development, [page 6](#)) have again expanded. During the last two years, the ODE has added required training in the topic areas of Dating Violence and Human Trafficking. On August 6, 2013 staff attending the PSI

Safety and Violence Prevention workshop received information on dating violence and beginning with the next school year, information on human trafficking will be added. The ODE has prepared a fact sheet on child victims that we are sharing below...

Fact Sheet for

Child Victims of Human Trafficking

What is human trafficking?

Right now in Ohio, more than 2,000 school-age children are potentially at risk of being forced into human trafficking through exploited labor, domestic servitude or prostitution. Children, especially those not living with their parents, are especially vulnerable. The average entry age into the commercial sex market is 12-14, although it is not unusual for the age to be younger.

Because the demand for young victims is large, traffickers find students through telephone chat lines, clubs, on the street through friends, and at malls. Traffickers may use girls to recruit other girls at schools and after-school programs, or involve school age boys in gaining and betraying the trust of potential victims. This means it is essential that youth see adults model healthy relationships and that schools create environments to support those students who are victims of violence and exploitation. Educators have an opportunity to help identify and guide youth who display risky behaviors to receive the appropriate community supports and services.

How can I identify a victim of human trafficking?

While not all of the behaviors listed below indicate that a child is a victim of human trafficking, educators should recognize that these red flags are cause for concern. Other causes may be teen dating violence, homelessness, domestic abuse and drug and alcohol abuse. This list is meant to be a guide to determine if further action is appropriate. It is not a comprehensive list of all signs of student trafficking.

- ✓ Does not attend school regularly;
- ✓ Runs away from home regularly;
- ✓ Has unexplained absences from school and is considered a truant;
- ✓ Talks about frequent travel to other cities;
- ✓ Has bruises or other physical trauma, is withdrawn and seems depressed or afraid;
- ✓ Doesn't seem to have control over her/his own schedule or identification documents;
- ✓ Is hungry, malnourished or dressed inappropriately for weather conditions or surroundings;
- ✓ Shows signs of drug addiction;
- ✓ Demonstrates a sudden change in clothing, behavior or has expensive items that a child usually cannot afford;

- ✓ Makes references to sexual situations that are unusual for a child of that age;
- ✓ Has a "boyfriend" who is noticeably older (10+ years);
- ✓ Uses language that is beyond his/her normal age or terms that are used in the commercial sex industry; engages in promiscuous behavior; and may be labeled "fast" by peers.

What should I do as an educator if I suspect a child is a victim?

- ✓ Recognize the red flags students may exhibit;
- ✓ Make the appropriate referral to school personnel and community contacts.

How do I report suspected human trafficking?

- ✓ In cases of immediate emergencies, it is best to call your local police department or emergency access number.

Heroin Use and Ohio Students

The news today seems filled with dire warnings about the epidemic of heroin usage. Indeed, the statistics are alarming and it is an area of concern for all educators and PSI employees. However, a recent survey that is completed annually, the Ohio Youth Risk Behavior Survey, would indicate an opposing trend in heroin usage and painkillers. Other behaviors surveyed indicate almost half of students have texted or emailed while driving and 29% report a height and weight that classify them as overweight or obese. PSI staff in all disciplines must continue to focus on these risky behaviors with their students...

Survey: Painkiller, heroin use down among Ohio students; many texting while driving

A survey of Ohio high school students on a variety of subjects showed a decline in both painkiller and heroin use. The Ohio Department of Health says its 2013 Ohio Youth Risk Behavior Survey showed a significant decrease in the percentage of students using both drugs from just two years ago. In 2011, 21.3 percent of students reported using prescription pain relievers or painkillers without a doctor's prescription one or more times during their life; in 2013 that dropped to 12.8 percent. When it comes to heroin use, 3.1 percent of students said they had used heroin in the 2011 survey. In 2013, that number dropped to 2 percent. The number of students who said they had used marijuana at least once in their lifetime dropped from 42.8 percent in 2011 to 35.7 percent in 2013. The number who had used marijuana in the past 30 days dropped from 23.6 percent to 20.7 percent. The number of students admitting they had used

cocaine, including powder, crack, or freebase one or more times during their life dropped from 7 percent in 2011 to 3.8 percent in 2013. The study found 30 percent of students admitted to drinking alcohol, while 15 percent said they used tobacco.

Department of Health added a new question to the survey for 2013. The department says 46 percent of students admitted to texting or emailing while driving a car. Outside of distracted driving, the study shows the vast majority of students are driving safely. Seatbelt use while riding in a car has increased to 92 percent and driving with someone who has been drinking has decreased to 17 percent.

The survey also asked about diet and exercise habits. Only 19.3 percent of students report eating fruits and vegetables five or more times per day, while 27 percent report eating fast food three or more times per week. Only 26 percent get the recommended 60 minutes daily physical

activity and 29 percent of students report a height and weight that classify them as overweight or obese.

This complimentary webinar featured PSI Literacy Expert, Dr. Tim Rasinski. Recent surveys of reading indicate that fluency is not an important competency in reading. Based on his own work with young and adolescent readers, Dr. Tim Rasinski made the case that reading fluency is indeed as a critical competency for reading at every grade level and that many students who struggle in reading are not sufficiently fluent. He shared effective and engaging strategies for making fluency instruction an integral part of any literacy classroom.

Safety and Violence Prevention Training: Have You Renewed?

Safety and Violence Prevention Training - **Renewals Now Due** - With the enactment of Ohio HB 276 in 2007, all PSI employees (with the exception of health aides and medical assistants) are required to receive 4 hours of training in **Safety and Violence Prevention**. This training must occur within 2 years of employment and be repeated every 5 years thereafter. The majority of PSI employees completed this training during the 2008-2009 school year but a renewal may need to be completed if not done within this last school year. *This is a requirement of your employment with PSI.*

While PSI will be developing its own online course sometime in the next year, in the interim we have found a resource for taking this required course online for a fee of \$10.00.

Postural, Vision and Hearing screenings should be nearing completion.

Closing Clinics for the Summer

Just a few reminders as the school year comes to an end:

- ④ Send the Medication at School, End of Year Procedure letter home to parents/guardians (pg.11 in the Medication section in the Health Resource Guide) for end of the year medication pick up.
- ④ For proper disposal of meds not picked up (this may not be done until your return in the fall if your building principal wants to allow additional time for pick up) federal guidelines need to be followed. These guidelines include:
 - ④ Not flushing prescription drugs down the toilet or drain unless accompanying patient information specifically instructs to do so.
 - ④ Taking prescription drugs to community drug takeback programs.
 - ④ Take prescription drugs out of original containers and mix with undesirable substance such as used coffee grounds. Put mixture into a disposable container with a lid (empty margarine tub or sealable bag).
 - ④ Conceal or remove any personal information, including Rx number, on the empty prescription bottle. Use black permanent marker if label cannot be removed.
 - ④ Place the sealed container with the mixture and the empty drug containers in the trash.
- ④ Send home medication forms and care plans for completion over the summer for those students who will need them in the fall.
- ④ Make sure that the updated Immunization information is provided to parents. The charts of the Immunization Requirements for Fall 2014 School Entry were emailed to all health staff in February. These charts are for your reference only and should not be sent to parents.
- ④ Send letters home to parents of 6th grade students that will be required to have the Booster Tdap when they enter 7th grade in the Fall.
- ④ Order supplies so clinics can open and be functional in the Fall.

Closing Clinics for the Summer Cont.

- Know the date your school is resuming classes for the 2014-15 school year.
- Safety and Violence Prevention Training - According to Ohio HB 276, all RNs and LPNs are required to have the four (4) hours of in-service training within 2 years of employment and every five years thereafter. You will receive information if you are determined to be in need of this training.
- Summer CPR/First Aid dates have been set. The schedule of classes has been sent to your psi-health email. All staff must have current CPR/First Aid when beginning school in the Fall. **Space is limited so register early.** To make a reservation for a class please contact Brenda Anderson via email at brendaanderson@psi-solutions.org or phone Brenda at 800-841-4774 ext. 237 or 330-425-8474. ext. 237. If leaving a phone message or sending an email, please include all details such as full name, phone number, desired session, etc. so that Brenda can properly register you.
- Please return ALL Vision and Hearing screening equipment, videos and any training tools that you have borrowed from PSI. If you need a UPS label call the PSI Health Services office at 330-425-8474 ext. 226 or 800-841-4774 ext. 226.
- Fingerprints! If the FBI and BCI Background check that PSI has on file is older than 5 years, you will need to be re-fingerprinted. More information is to come.
- Remember to check your psi-health email regularly for important updates and information!

ODH Regional School Nurse Conference Updates

The 2014 Immunization Summary. Items that were highlighted for school entry in the fall were the Tdap required for all students in grades 7-11. For students in grades 10 and 11 a Td is acceptable. Also that the FINAL polio dose in the IPV series must be administered at age 4 or older with AT LEAST SIX MONTHS between the FINAL and PREVIOUS DOSE. A copy of this chart was emailed to all health staff in February.

ODH Infectious Disease Control Manual (IDCM) was updated in January 2014. This manual is available online by going to the ODH website at <http://www.odh.ohio.gov>. Click on "I" in the "A-Z" index. The manual is updated at least annually. Included in this year's IDCM updates there is new information on Pediculosis in Section 6.
